Students in Ferguson Schools Respond Positively to After-school Chess Clubs

In fall 2015, Ascension financed an after-school chess program in the Ferguson-Florissant School District in a partnership with the Saint Louis Chess Club and Scholastic Center. Eighteen clubs at 16 different schools were created in the first semester of the program. These schools serve a highly disadvantaged population of students, with an average 79 percent free/reduced lunch rate an average percent minority of 88 percent.

The St. Louis Chess Club administered surveys to the students participating in the after-school chess clubs in Ferguson to gauge the effectiveness of the program.

Feedback surveys given to students in the fall sessions find that:

- Nearly half of the students reported that they had never played chess before, while an additional third had only played a few times.
- 85% of students say they look forward to school more on days when they have the Chess Club (20% somewhat agree, 65% strongly agree);
- 94% of students report that the Chess Club has taught them that they can complete difficult tasks if they work hard (30% somewhat agree, 64% strongly agree);
- 92% of students report that the Chess Club has made them more confident that they can learn difficult material (35% somewhat agree, 57% strongly agree);
- 95% of students report that their experience in Chess Club make them want to challenge themselves more in the future (32% somewhat agree, 63% strongly agree).

Additionally, a pre and post survey given to the students finds that participating in the after-school chess program:

- Significantly increased the amount of time they spent playing chess with their family and friends;
- Significantly increased their confidence in their chess-playing abilities; and decreased their belief that chess is confusing. In pre-surveys 32% strongly agreed that chess was something they were good at, in post surveys that number rose to 65%. At the same time, in pre-surveys 29% strongly disagreed that "chess is confusing." In post-surveys, that number grew to 69%.

• Significantly increased their plans to continue playing chess when they are adults. In pre-surveys 21% said they strongly agreed that they will play chess as an adult, in post-surveys that number grew to 43%.
In summary, the Saint Louis Chess Club and Scholastic Center's afterschool programs are producing numerous positive impacts for the students they serve in Ferguson-Florissant schools. Future research will continue to shed light on the benefits of this important program.
